

Right to Know Week NSW 2024



- Right to Know (RTK) Week NSW 2024 was held on 23 29
 September 2024
- About Right to Know Week: 28 September marks
 International Day for Universal Access to Information. The right
 to seek and receive information encapsulated by Article 19 of
 the United Nations' Declaration of Human Rights
- The IPC celebrates an annual, week-long celebration around this international day.
- RTK focuses on educating NSW agencies and the public about the *Government Information (Public Access) Act 2009* (GIPA Act) and raising awareness about rights and obligations for accessing NSW government-held information.
- Right to Know Week in particular supports NSW public sector agencies explore opportunities to provide access to more government information as well as to better understand their obligations.

The Information and Privacy Commission NSW Who we are

- IPC is an independent agency that supports the Information Commissioner and the Privacy Commissioner to oversight the NSW public sector in relation to privacy and information access. The Information Commissioner is the CEO.
- Some of the key IPC/Commissioner functions are:
 - Promote and protect privacy and information access rights in NSW
 - Provide information, advice, assistance and training for agencies and individuals
 - Review and audit the performance and decisions of agencies
 - Investigate complaints and manage PIDs about privacy and information access
 - Provide advice to the NSW Government about legislation and technology

Role of the Information Commissioner

- Promote public awareness & understanding of the GIPA Act
- Provide information, advice, assistance & training to agencies and the public
- Assist agencies in the exercise of their functions under the GIPA Act
- Issue guidelines & publications to assist both agencies & the public
- Review GIPA decisions made by agencies
- Monitor, audit and report on agencies & their use of and compliance with the GIPA Act
- Make reports and provide recommendations to the Ministers about proposals for legislative and administrative changes
- Investigate complaints under the Government Information (Information Commissioner) Act 2009 (GIIC Act)

Theme

Mainstreaming Access to Information and Participation in the Public Sector in NSW

- Transparency is a core pillar for supporting public participation in the public sector.
- Rights to access government information can make public participation both possible and meaningful. Successful public participation can help create more responsive and effective policies and increase trust between communities and public institutions.
- It is important to keep reminding ourselves about the critical link between public participation and access to government information.

Proactive release

- Authorised proactive release of government information by NSW public sector agencies supports a system of democratic government that is open, accountable, fair and effective.
- Proactive release supports effective public participation in government processes and decision-making by making information about the design and delivery of government services accessible, and by promoting government accountability.
- It creates a better-informed community through raising public awareness of governments' strategic intentions and initiatives.

Tools to support transparency



Agency Information Guides

 The GIPA Act requires NSW agencies to publish an Agency Information Guide (AIG) that provides information about their structure, functions, and the types of information they hold.

Annual reviews of proactive information release programs

 Under the GIPA Act, agencies are required to review their proactive release programs each year, with the outcomes of that review reported publicly and to the IPC.

Digital Technologies

- IPC encourages agencies and SOCs to get even more proactive about transparency to ensure new technologies, such as AI or automated decision-making (ADM), help not hinder public participation.
- When adopting new technologies, public institutions also need to give careful thought to their record-keeping and to the preservation of information access rights.
- IPC encourages NSW agencies and SOCs to:
 - ensure technology contracts preserve their ability to explain their decisionmaking
 - adopt a transparency by design approach to technology projects
 - include descriptions of the use of ADM in their AIGs to support explainability around how decisions are made.
