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Privacy and Personal Information Protection Act 1998

Order

I, the Hon. Jihad Dib, MP, pursuant to section 31 of the Privacy and Personal Information Protection Act 1998, by this order, make the **Service NSW Privacy Code of Practice - Fraud Management**, which is annexed to this order, as a privacy code of practice.

Service NSW Privacy Code of Practice - fraud management

1 Overview

- 1.1. This is a privacy code of practice (**Code**) made under Part 3, Division 1 of the *Privacy and Personal Information Protection Act 1998* (NSW) (**PPIP Act**). For the purposes of section 29(5) of the PPIP Act, this Code applies to certain functions undertaken by Service NSW, as set out in this Code.
- 1.2. Part 2, Division 1 of the PPIP Act sets out IPPs that apply to Public Sector Agencies. This Code modifies the application of the IPPs as specified in clause 5 of this Code.
- 1.3. This Code does not affect the operation of any exemption provided under Part 2, Division 3 of the PPIP Act. This is consistent with section 29(6) of the PPIP Act.
- 1.4. This Code does not affect the operation of any exemptions or modifications of the PPIP Act provided in the *Service NSW (One-stop Access to Government Services) Act 2013* (NSW) (**Service Act**) or otherwise.
- 1.5. This Code does not provide authority for any activity that constitutes a criminal offence or is otherwise unlawful.
- 1.6. This Code will cease to have effect if legislation is enacted that confers appropriate powers and functions to allow Service NSW to undertake the activities outlined in this Code.

2 Definitions and interpretation

- 2.1. In this Code, a term or expression starting with a capital letter has the meaning given in clause 2.2.
- 2.2. In this Code:
 - '**ADF**' has the same meaning as in Schedule 1, clause (b).
 - '**AFP**' has the same meaning as in Schedule 1, clause (l).
 - '**ASIC**' has the same meaning as in Schedule 1, clause (f).
 - '**ATO**' has the same meaning as in Schedule 1, clause (g).
 - '**CEO**' has the same meaning as in section 3(1) of the Service Act. From 1 July 2024, references to the CEO are deemed to be references to the Secretary of DCS.
 - '**Code**' has the same meaning as in clause 1.1.
 - '**Commencement Date**' means the date on which the Code is gazetted in the NSW Government Gazette.
 - '**CPA**' has the same meaning as in Schedule 1, clause (a).
 - '**DCJ**' has the same meaning as in Schedule 1, clause (q).
 - '**DCS**' means the NSW Department of Customer Service.
 - '**DVA**' has the same meaning as in Schedule 1, clause (b).
 - '**Eligibility Functions**' has the same meaning as in clause 3.5.
 - '**Entity Resolution**' means any process of determining whether multiple Records are referencing the same person, information, facility, device, or other thing, including an individual, an organisation or any other legal entity, a physical or postal address, an email address, a phone number, a bank account, or a device.
 - '**Generated Information**' means any information Service NSW creates with reference to, or generated from, other information Service NSW holds.
 - '**GRV**' means a grant, rebate, voucher, benefit or other payment.
 - '**Information Use Activities**' has the same meaning as in clause 3.6.

‘Investigative Functions’ has the same meaning as in clause 3.4.

‘IPP’ means any of the information protection principles set out in Part 2, Division 1 of the PPIP Act.

‘MyServiceNSW Account’ means the account service administered by Service NSW to connect users to NSW Government services and perform MyServiceNSW Account Transactions online. For the avoidance of doubt, this includes accounts accessed via the Service NSW website and the Service NSW mobile phone application.

‘MyServiceNSW Account Platform’ means the current and any replacement information technology platform through which users perform MyServiceNSW Account Transactions.

‘MyServiceNSW Account Transaction’ means a transaction or service available through the MyServiceNSW Account Platform, for example, a GRV, licence renewal or registration renewal.

‘Named Party’ has the same meaning as in clause 4.9.

‘NSWPF’ has the same meaning as in Schedule 1, clause (l).

‘Objection Period’ has the same meaning as in clause 6.7(a)(i).

‘On Hand Record’ means any data Service NSW holds:

- (a) due to collection in accordance with clauses 4.2 and 4.5;
- (b) held in the Private Environment; and
- (c) contained in the MyServiceNSW Account Platform,
- (d) including, Generated Information.

‘Personal Information’ has the same meaning as in section 4 of the PPIP Act.

‘PPIP Act’ has the same meaning as in clause 1.1.

‘Privacy Commissioner’ means the statutory officer of that title appointed under the PPIP Act from time to time.

‘Private Environment’ means a secure computer infrastructure environment located within New South Wales.

‘Processes’ means the business processes, practices, methodology, templates, software, procedures, training material, and logic used to perform the Information Use Activities.

‘Public Sector Agency’ has the same meaning as in section 3 of the PPIP Act.

‘RBA’ has the same meaning as in Schedule 1, clause (o).

‘Record’ means any document or other source of information compiled, recorded or stored in written form or on film, or by electronic process, or in any other manner or by any other means.

‘Schedule 1 Notice’ has the same meaning as in clause 6.6.

‘Service Act’ means the *Service NSW (One-stop Access to Government Services) Act 2013* (NSW).

‘SR Act’ has the same meaning as in clause 4.4.

‘Systems’ means the information technology environments dedicated to the storage of data used in connection with this Code, including the Private Environment.

‘Third Party Supplied Record’ has the same meaning as in clause 4.5.

‘User Supplied Record’ has the same meaning as in clause 4.2.

2.3. In this Code, the following rules of interpretation apply:

- (a) the singular includes the plural and vice versa.
- (b) the words 'such as', 'for example', 'including', 'particularly' and similar expressions are not used as, nor are intended to be, interpreted as words of limitation; and
- (c) if a period of time is calculated from a particular day, act or event, it is to be calculated exclusive of that day, or the day of that act or event.

3 Background

3.1. Service NSW is:

- (a) a NSW government Executive Agency established under Schedule 1 Part 2 of the *Government Sector Employment Act 2013* (NSW). The functions of Service NSW include the exercise of customer service functions delegated or conferred on the CEO under the Service Act; other functions conferred or imposed on the CEO by statute; and other functions relating to the delivery of Government services, as directed by the Minister responsible for Service NSW.
- (b) defined as a Public Service agency in section 3 and Schedule 1 of the *Government Sector Employment Act 2013* (NSW), and
- (c) a Public Sector Agency.

3.2. Service NSW primarily delivers services to the people of NSW through the MyServiceNSW Account Platform, which facilitates the creation of MyServiceNSW Accounts and enables users to perform MyServiceNSW Account Transactions.

3.3. Service NSW is necessarily required to prevent, detect and investigate fraud related to the use of MyServiceNSW accounts, including to perform MyServiceNSW Account Transactions.

3.4. The Minister has conferred additional functions on the CEO, relating to the prevention, detection and investigation of fraud relating to the use of MyServiceNSW accounts and MyServiceNSW Account Transactions, including:

- (a) undertaking investigations to determine whether an applicant for a MyServiceNSW Account has used the personal information of another person for an improper purpose;
- (b) undertaking investigations to determine whether an applicant for a MyServiceNSW Account has provided information that is misleading or untrue;
- (c) undertaking investigations to determine whether a person who has received a grant, rebate, voucher, or other payment or benefit pursuant to a program administered by Service NSW was eligible to receive that grant, rebate, voucher, payment or benefit;
- (d) undertaking fraud prevention and detection activities, including the use of data analytic tools to determine whether any MyServiceNSW Account has been or is likely to be used for fraudulent or otherwise unauthorised purposes; and
- (e) undertaking any function that is ancillary to a function referred to in paragraph (a) to (c).
(together, the **Investigative Functions**).

3.5. The CEO is from time-to-time conferred functions with respect to GRVs. This includes:

- (a) the determination of eligibility for a GRV;
- (b) compliance with the terms and conditions of a GRV; and
- (c) collecting debts owed in circumstances where there has been noncompliance with the terms and conditions of a GRV,
(together, the **Eligibility Functions**).

3.6. In performing the Investigative Functions and the Eligibility Functions, Service NSW will, in accordance with this Code:

- (a) collect Records directly from customers;
- (b) collect Records indirectly from third parties;
- (c) use Records; and
- (d) disclose Records to third parties.

(together, the **Information Use Activities**).

4 Information covered by the Code

4.1. As part of its Information Use Activities, Service NSW has identified the following information flows, to which this Code applies, that require the collection, use and disclosure of Personal Information, stipulated below:

- (a) **Information flow 1:** collection and use of user supplied MyServiceNSW Account data into the Private Environment and storage of such data;
- (b) **Information flow 2:** collection and use of third-party data into the Private Environment and storage of such data; and
- (c) **Information flow 3:** disclosure of On Hand Records.

Information flow 1: user supplied MyServiceNSW Account data

Collection

4.2. Service NSW collects the following Records in respect of MyServiceNSW Accounts from users:

- (a) during MyServiceNSW Account creation; Records provided by users including email address and mobile number;
- (b) once the MyServiceNSW Account has been created; Records the user chooses to add to their MyServiceNSW Account, including information required to turn on multi-factor authentication or information provided in connection with performing a MyServiceNSW Account Transaction. This may include the user's name, residential address, and mailing address;
- (c) when performing a MyServiceNSW Account Transaction; Records provided by users including name, date of birth, driver licence details, Medicare card details, bank account details, MyServiceNSW Account IDs and contact details, such as, address, email address, and phone number; and
- (d) in using a MyServiceNSW Account or performing a MyServiceNSW Account Transaction, other Records, such as, IP address, biometrics, and device information, such as, device model and IMEI number,

(together, **User Supplied Records**).

Use

4.3. Service NSW uses User Supplied Records and On Hand Records to:

- (a) perform Entity Resolution;
- (b) verify MyServiceNSW Account user identities;
- (c) perform the Investigative Functions; and
- (d) perform the Eligibility Functions.

Storage

4.4. Service NSW takes reasonable steps to ensure that it stores User Supplied Records and On Hand Records in the Private Environment, according to internal policies aligned to the *State Records Act 1998* (NSW) (**SR Act**), including the standards and codes of best practice for records management approved in accordance with the SR Act.

Information flow 2: third party supplied data

Collection

- 4.5. Service NSW collects Records about customers indirectly from third parties, where reasonably necessary for use in accordance with clause 4.6, from:
- (a) private sector entities;
 - (b) public sector entities (at the federal and state level, both within New South Wales and from other Australian jurisdictions); and
 - (c) from the general public for example by email, phone or correspondence, lodging an online report, reporting via the dedicated hotline, or staff reporting.
(together, the **Third Party Supplied Records**).

Use

- 4.6. Service NSW uses Third Party Supplied Records and On Hand Records to:
- (a) perform Entity Resolution;
 - (b) verify MyServiceNSW Account user identities;
 - (c) perform the Investigative Functions; and
 - (d) perform the Eligibility Functions.

Storage

- 4.7. Service NSW stores Third Party Supplied Records in the Private Environment, according to internal policies aligned to the SR Act, including the standards and codes of best practice for records management approved in accordance with the SR Act.
- 4.8. Service NSW will undertake security risk assessments and other related security assurance processes every six months. Service NSW will implement further security and access controls (including, where appropriate, encryption and further network segregation) to provide additional protection to specific data. Service NSW will implement any further security access controls that are deemed appropriate by the CEO or Service NSW Chief Security Officer.

Information flow 3: disclosure of On Hand Records*Disclosure*

- 4.9. Service NSW discloses On Hand Records to the third parties named in Schedule 1 (**Named Party**) for the purposes of:
- (a) verifying a User Supplied Record, for example, Service NSW discloses passport information to the Department of Home Affairs to verify the legitimacy of the passport;
 - (b) verifying a MyServiceNSW Account user identity;
 - (c) performing the Investigative Functions; and
 - (d) performing the Eligibility Functions,
- provided Service NSW has a reasonable belief the disclosure would assist in identifying, detecting, preventing, or responding to, suspected fraud, identity theft, or other similar conduct. For example, Service NSW discloses On Hand Records to financial institutions to prevent fraud or identity misuse in relation to their financial services.
- 4.10. For the avoidance of doubt, Service NSW discloses On Hand Records or components of On Hand Records, as contemplated by clause 4.9, to Named Parties other than the Named Party who initially supplied the relevant On Hand Record.

5 Modification of the information protection principles

- 5.1. The application of the information protection principles set out in Part 2, Division 1 of the PPIP Act to public sector agencies is modified as follows.

IPP 1 (section 8) – collection of personal information for a lawful purpose

5.2. There is no intention to depart from this principle.

IPP 2 (section 9) – collection of personal information directly from individual

5.3. Service NSW is not required to comply with section 9 of the PPIP Act when Service NSW collects Personal Information in accordance with clause 4.5.

IPP 3 (section 10) – requirements when collecting personal information

5.4. There is no intention to depart from this principle.

5.5. Notwithstanding clause 5.4, Service NSW must publish general information about the Personal Information it collects, uses and discloses in accordance with this Code on its website, unless to do so would prejudice SNSW's ability to identify, detect, prevent and respond to suspected fraud, identity theft, or other similar conduct.

IPP 4 (section 11) – other requirements relating to collection of personal information

5.6. There is no intention to depart from this principle.

IPP 5 (section 12) – retention and security of personal information

5.7. There is no intention to depart from this principle.

IPP 6 (section 13) – information about personal information held by agencies

5.8. There is no intention to depart from this principle.

IPP 7 (section 14) – access to personal information held by agencies

5.9. There is no intention to depart from this principle.

IPP 8 (section 15) – alteration of personal information

5.10. There is no intention to depart from this principle.

IPP 9 (section 16) – agency must check accuracy of personal information before use

5.11. There is no intention to depart from this principle.

IPP 10 (section 17) – limits on use of personal information

5.12. Service NSW is not required to comply with section 17 of the PPIP Act to the extent that it uses Personal Information collected as set out in this Code for the purposes of clauses 4.3 and 4.6.

IPP 11 (section 18) – limits on disclosure of personal information

5.13. Service NSW is not required to comply with section 18 of the PPIP Act to the extent that it discloses Personal Information in accordance with clauses 4.9 and 4.10.

IPP 12 (section 19) – special restrictions on disclosure of personal information

5.14. There is no intention to depart from this principle.

6 Review and audit

6.1. Subject to clause 6.4, within 30 days of each anniversary of the Commencement Date, Service NSW will appoint an independent auditor to assess compliance with this Code. This audit will evaluate whether the Systems and Processes comply with the requirements of this Code.

6.2. Service NSW will complete the audit contemplated by clause 6.1, promptly and in any event, within 90 days from the date of commencement of the audit.

6.3. Service NSW will provide the Privacy Commissioner a copy of the audit findings and any accompanying report promptly, and in any event, at the conclusion of the 90-day period contemplated by clause 6.2.

- 6.4. Notwithstanding clause 6.1, in extenuating circumstances, Service NSW may, by notice to the Privacy Commissioner, request an extension of time to commence the audit contemplated by clause 6.1, setting out the reasons why such circumstances impact its ability to comply with clause 6.1.
- 6.5. Notwithstanding clauses 6.1, 6.2 and 6.3, the Privacy Commissioner may agree at any time to modify the audit timing, frequency, scope or subject matter based on the findings of any audit, or request by Service NSW to the IPC under clause 6.4 or otherwise.
- 6.6. On each anniversary of the Commencement Date, Service NSW may update Schedule 1 by providing notice to the Privacy Commissioner clearly identifying the changes (**Schedule 1 Notice**).
- 6.7. If the Privacy Commissioner:
- (a) objects to any aspect of the Schedule 1 Notice:
 - (i) it must raise concerns with Service NSW within 60 days (**Objection Period**), identifying the disputed elements and the reasons for concern; and
 - (ii) Service NSW and the Privacy Commissioner will engage in good faith negotiations to resolve the matter, and the non-disputed elements of the Schedule 1 Notice will take effect, and the disputed elements will remain unchanged until the matter is resolved; or
 - (i) does not object within the Objection Period as contemplated by paragraph (a), the revised Schedule 1 will take effect according to the Schedule 1 Notice at the conclusion of the Objection Period.
- 6.8. Service NSW will report to the NSW Privacy Commissioner on compliance with this Code, including the following matters:
- (a) details of any complaints received from the public regarding the use and/or disclosure of personal information under this Code periodically; and
 - (b) any data breaches arising from this Code involving personal information will be handled in accordance with Part 6A of the PPIP Act promptly following the data breach.

SCHEDULE 1 – Named Parties

For the purposes of clause 4.9, the Named Parties are, as follows:

- (a) an accountant member of Certified Practising Accountant (CPA) Australia, Institute of Public Accountants or a registered tax agent;
- (b) the department responsible for providing support, services and benefits to veterans, and current and former Australian Defence Force (ADF) members and their families, currently operating as the Department of Veterans' Affairs (DVA);
- (c) entities authorised or licensed to conduct insurance under law including under the *Insurance Act 1973* (Cth);
- (d) the agency responsible for administering the NSW Government's official digital service for delivering land and property information via an integrated search function, currently operating as NSW Point, and currently administered by Spatial Services;
- (e) the agency responsible for delivering social welfare, health and government payments and services to individuals, families and businesses in Australia, currently operating as Services Australia;
- (f) the regulatory authority responsible for regulating companies, financial services and markets in Australia, currently operating as the Australian Securities and Investment Commission (ASIC);
- (g) the regulatory authority responsible for taxation in Australia, currently operating as the Australian Taxation Office (ATO);
- (h) the technology company responsible for providing legal, property and business search services in Australia, currently operating as InfoTrack Pty Limited;
- (i) the statutory body under the *Small Business Commissioner Act 2012 (NSW)*, currently operating as the NSW Small Business Commission;
- (j) the national regulator of charities in Australia, currently operating as the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission;
- (k) the financial intelligence unit and anti-money laundering regulator, currently operating as the Australian Transaction Reports and Analysis Centre;
- (l) law enforcement agencies, whose primary responsibility is the maintenance of public order, prevention of crime, enforcement of law and the ensuring of community safety, currently, the New South Wales Police Force (NSWPF) and the Australian Federal Police (AFP), and/or any other agency responsible, or partially responsible, for the same;
- (m) DCS, including any agency, division, statutory body or entity within its portfolio, as restructured or renamed from time to time;
- (n) the Australian Government agency responsible for operating and managing the Document Verification Service, currently, the Department of Home Affairs;
- (o) any government agency, department, body, regulator, authority or agency responsible for issuing regulating or enforcing trade, occupational, or professional licenses under applicable law, for example, NSW Fair Trading, Safework NSW, Transport for NSW, the Tax Practitioners Board, the Pharmacy Board, Liquor & Gaming NSW, the Legal Profession Admission Board, NSW Law Society, Office of the Legal Services Commissioner, the Australian Prudential Regulation Board, and the Reserve Bank of Australia (RBA);
- (p) financial institutions engaged in the provision of financial products or services regulated under applicable Australian laws, including but not limited to the *Banking Act 1959*


(Cth), *Corporations Act 2001* (Cth), and *Anti-Money Laundering and Counter-Terrorism Financing Act 2006* (Cth);

- (q) the department responsible for justice, child protection, housing, community services and related functions, including any successor department or agency that assumes these responsibilities, currently operating as the Department of Communities and Justice (DCJ);
- (r) the principal department responsible for leading disaster preparedness, recovery and resilience efforts in NSW, including coordinating emergency response and supporting communities impacted by disasters, currently operating as the NSW Reconstruction Authority;
- (s) any Service NSW partner agency, including any department, agency, statutory body, authority or entity that:
 - (i) works in collaboration with or on behalf of the NSW Government;
 - (ii) has regulatory, administrative, service delivery or enforcement functions; or
 - (iii) is otherwise authorised or required by law or agreement, to engage in activities relevant to this Code.
